From Las Familias Solidarity and Annunciation House: Thank you so much for all that your congregation contributed to Las Familias Solidarity this month. We saw increased militarization of El Paso with 200 Texas National Guard members deployed. Yet the shelter volunteers were calmer than a month ago, filled with faith and trust in God. Inspiring to our team members who were there. The numbers of asylum seekers are up, averaging 450-500 asylum seeking family members released to the Annunciation House Network. Single men are sent to city and county processing centers, and often to detention centers.
